# **Welcome Audio Group Visitors!**

<u>Instructions for Chaperones:</u> On this tour you will not only learn about Eastern State Penitentiary's architecture and history, but also explore how this prison's history influences prisons today. Use this guide to help your group follow the audio tour, discuss what they learned, and explore the rest of the site.

Ask your group any of the following questions and write responses down. You will return to these ideas after the tour:

What do you think you will see today? What do you think of when you hear the word "prison"? What does justice mean to you?	

#### Key words your students should know:

- Incarceration: the state of being in prison or in jail.
- Penitentiary: a prison designed to make people reflect on their crime.
- Rehabilitation: when a person in prison becomes less likely to break the law.
- Solitary Confinement: living alone in a cell with little human contact.
- Sentence: the period of time a person is incarcerated.
